Here you will learn about the importance of the Pottery industry in our local area and what lead to industry decline. We will discover what led to this becoming the centre of industry and visit historical sites to gather facts. We will consider what impact and lasting legacy the Pottery industry has had on the area.

Begin your learning with a fact finder of the Tudor reign. What was so significant during this period and which monarchs left the most lasting Legacy? Discover why Henry VIII set up his own church and why Elizabeth I is so famous. Finally, compare the monarchs and discover what bought the Tudor rule to an end.

Vikings and Anglo Saxons



Carrying out historical enquires, you will discover why the Vikings repeatedly attempted to invade Britain, and how close they came, before succeeding. We will consider evidence that casts doubt on the Viking warrior reputation and takes a closer look at daily Viking life. A visit to the Viking city of York, will bring our learning and theories to life as we retrace their footsteps. Finally, we explore how Viking and Anglo Saxon Britain came to an end.



Anglo Saxons



Examine the reasons which caused the Anglo Saxons to invade Britain, settling alongside the Jukes and Scots. How did they live their daily lives and how can we be certain? We will use primary resources to state what we have found about Anglo Saxon governance. You will decide how the Anglo Saxon period compares with Roman rule.

You will examine resources to fact find who founded Rome, how the Roman Empire became so strong, leading to their invasion of Britain. You will compare and contrast Roman and Iron Age life and the explore the sequence of events of Boudica and her army who attempted to prevent Roman settlement. Through historical enquiries, we will explore the legacies and inventions the Romans left us, that we still benefit from today.

Stone Age to Iron Age



Here you will learn key changes of how people lived over thousands of years before the Romans arrived, and study historical sites, such as, Stone Henge. We answer the question - Were they simply hunter gatherers? Through historical enquiry, using primary resources, we will consider daily life, with a focus on the local region, during this changing period and state what we believe is the greatest achievement of this time.
